ENTRY DOCUMENTS

Travelers arriving in Jordan are required to have passports that will be valid for at least six months from the date of departure and contain at least two blank pages for affixing entry and exit stamps. Also required is a confirmed round-trip airline ticket, airline ticket to other destination(s) or cruise ship documents.

Tourist Visas for US citizens are processed on arrival, for JD 40, paid in cash. Groups of 5 or more people are eligible for a free visa if they are staying longer than 48 hours and provide passport information to Africa Answers in advance.

VACCINATIONS AND MEDICATION

No vaccinations or medications are currently required for entry to Jordan directly from the USA. Travelers entering Jordan from yellow fever areas including, but not limited to, West and Central Africa, should be prepared to show their vaccination or exemption certification.

Travelers taking prescription medications into Jordan are advised to have the medication in the original packaging and bring a copy of the prescription. Medication in baggies is subject to confiscation.

MONEY

Jordan's national currency is the Jordan Dinar. Currency is readily available throughout the country at foreign exchanges and ATMs found in just about every major hotel and airport, and at banks. US dollars are accepted, but you may not get a favorable exchange rate; Africa Answers recommends having some dinar.

Cash is required to shop in souks. In stores and hotels, Visa and Mastercard are widely accepted, American Express less so. Credit cards will usually attract a fee of 3-10%.

TIPPING

Tipping in Jordan is not expected, but is common practice. Porters are usually tipped \$1-2 per bag. In restaurants, service is already included but an additional 5% for your waiter is appreciated. Transfer drivers should be tipped \$2-\$5 depending on distance. Guides should receive \$10-15/day per person. Drivers should receive \$5-10/day per person.

SAFETY AND SECURITY

Jordan is a very safe destination, however, Africa Answers always recommends using the safe in your room to store cash, important documents and other valuables.

ELECTRICITY

POTABLE WATER

Tap water in Jordan is safe to drink. Bottled water is provided by most hotels at a modest cost.

DRESS CODE

Jordan does not have a strict code of dress, however, unless you are at a beach resort, conservative dress is appropriate. Shorts and strapless tops are considered immodest and will attract attention.

To enter a mosque, men and women should both dress modestly, in loose-fitting clothing that completely covers the arms and legs—no shorts or sleeveless shirts for either gender. Women should also bring a scarf to cover their hair.

BARTERING

Jordanians enjoy, and expect, to barter on prices. In stores and at markets.
