ENTRY DOCUMENTS

Travelers arriving in Morocco are required to have passports that will be valid for at least six months from the date of departure and contain at least two blank pages for affixing entry and exit stamps. Also required is a confirmed round-trip airline ticket, airline ticket to other destination(s) or cruise ship documents.

Tourist Visas for US citizens are processed on arrival, at no charge.

VACCINATIONS AND MEDICATION

No vaccinations or medications are currently required for entry to Morocco directly from the USA. Travelers entering Morocco from yellow fever areas including, but not limited to, West and Central Africa, should be prepared to show their vaccination or exemption certification.

Travelers taking prescription medications into Morocco are advised to have the medication in the original packaging and bring a copy of the prescription. Medication in baggies is subject to confiscation.

MONEY

Morocco's national currency is the Morocco Dirham. Currency is readily available throughout the country at foreign exchanges and ATMs found in just about every major hotel and airport, and at banks. US dollars are accepted at some shops, but you may not get a favorable exchange rate; Africa Answers recommends using dirham throughout your trip.

Cash is required to shop in souks. In major stores and hotels, Visa and Mastercard are sometimes accepted, American Express less so. Credit cards will usually attract a fee of 3-10%.

TIPPING

Tipping in Morocco is common practice. Porters are usually tipped \$1 per bag. In restaurants, 10% service is usually already included, please check before tipping an additional amount. Transfer drivers should be tipped \$2 depending on distance. Guides should receive \$10-15/day per person. Drivers should receive \$5-10/day per person.

SAFETY AND SECURITY

Morocco is a safe destination, however, Africa Answers always recommends using the safe in your room to store cash, important documents and other valuables.

There are pickpockets in Morocco. When in public, please be mindful of your wallet, and carry it in a secure place.

ELECTRICITY

220 volts is the electrical current used throughout Morocco. Power plugs and sockets have two round pins. For detailed information, images and links to purchase adaptors, please consult https://www.power-plugs-sockets.com

POTABLE WATER

Tap water in Morocco is not safe to drink. Bottled water is provided by most hotels at a modest cost.

DRESS CODE

Morocco does not have a strict code of dress, however, unless you are at a beach resort, conservative dress is appropriate. Shorts and strapless tops are considered immodest and will attract attention.

To enter a mosque, men and women should both dress modestly, in loose-fitting clothing that completely covers the arms and legs—no shorts or sleeveless shirts for either gender. Women should also bring a scarf to cover their hair.

BARTERING

Moroccans enjoy, and expect, to barter on prices. In stores and at markets.
